My Life with Grady-White Boats

When I first retired and built a house on the beach at Eastern Lake in Walton County, Florida, my wife felt I needed a hobby to keep me from being a constant bother to her. In 1995, she took action. She gave me the book *Along the Edge of America* by Peter Jenkins. It is a vivid story about a man and his boat, a Grady-White *Sailfish 25*, traveling the shorelines of America, spending time in many ports to learn about the people and write their story.

The book conveys how Peter Jenkins decided Grady-White was the best boat for his three-year adventure. After reading the book with an elevated level of enthusiasm, I bought my first Grady-White, a *Tournament 192*. I love road trips, and this was a road trip by water, thus the name of my first Grady-White, *Road Trip I*, which was followed by *Road Trip II*, *III*, *IV*, *V*, and *VI*. I even bought an additional Grady-White *Tournament 192* we named *Never Land*, as a gift for my granddaughter.

When I got on the water with my first Grady, I felt like I was driving a bus and would wreck everything in my path. I kept it five months and with only a compass, a spyglass, and a chart, I navigated from Cannons Marina in Sarasota Beach, Florida, through the Intracoastal Waterway, across Lake Okeechobee, down the East Coast to Marathon, and cut back through Snake Creek into the Gulf of Mexico, and on to Key West. Part of the trip was 20 miles offshore. Not very smart, but I was learning. My son, Charles, and my daughter, Elizabeth, accompanied me on my journey.

After that trip, I felt like I was ready for a larger boat. That's where Pompano Beach Marine Center enters the story as they sold me five more Grady-White boats, starting with a *Tournament 225*. Again, I felt like I was driving a bus, but I made a comfortable transition in about two weeks. Sixty days later, I traded that boat for a twin engine *Sailfish 272*. But after 30 days, I traded again for a twin engine *Marlin 300*, the largest boat Grady-White built at that time. Four years later, Grady came out with the *Express 330* and I traded the *300* for one of the first *330s* produced, powered by one of the first pair of Yamaha 225 four stroke engines.

During those nine years, I met Eddie Smith, CEO of Grady-White. We were both members of YPO (Young Presidents Organization) thus our friendship. Eddie told me I was the first person to ever buy four brand new Grady-Whites in a 12-month period. He said I used a Grady differently

from many of his customers. In the early years, I fished and cruised. The last six years I mainly cruised four or five months out of the year with ventures in Key West, Abacos, Exumas, Eleuthera Island (Pink Beaches), Paradise Island/Atlantis Marina, Camden Main, Boothbay, Kennebunkport, Martha's Vineyard, Nantucket, Block Island, Long Island, New York Harbor, Hudson River, Erie Canal, Lake Champaign, Biloxi, Mississippi, Pensacola, Florida, Destin, and Panama City Beach (home base). I crossed the Gulf Stream in tenfoot seas and got caught in a white out

in the Abacos. I always felt safe in my Grady-White.

When I bought the *Express 330*, I had plans to take it from Key West to Cancun, which would require a bladder with extra fuel, and then travel down the coast through the Panama Canal and up the Western Coast to the Inside Passage to Alaska. I also wanted to do the Great Loop which I never did. But a new opportunity came up that would take a lot of my time, so I decided to sell the boat.

Today, I am back in a Grady *Freedom 285* still taking long cruising trips, but I have

to get a hotel room when I stop. When I had the *Marlin* I loved sleeping on my boat, even though I had a residence right there on the beach. Lately, that has me thinking about going back to the *Marlin*, which is, in my opinion the best overall in the Grady lineup for how I use my boat.

I would never have a boat I could not handle, dock, and cast off by myself. In case you are wondering about my age, I am 84 years old and can still do all of the above and see no end.

Whether I keep the *285*, or go back to the *300*, I can say with assurance, I've had a great boating life thanks to Grady-White.

Luis and Melissa Riesco Find New Adventure on the Water

"That is the boat I want!" Luis Riesco told his wife, Melissa, as they entered a local marina's boat yard. They'd recently purchased a condo along the Delaware shore and though they were not planning to purchase a boat at the time, they had decided to walk over to the local marina just for fun.

This was a pivotal moment for Luis as he saw a boat in a hoist being power washed. He recalls, "It had outriggers, two motors, and beautiful lines. I knew at that moment it was exactly the boat I wanted to own." Luis and Melissa walked into the marina, and he asked about the boat. As fate would have it, they told him the owner planned to sell at the end of the summer and they gave Luis his number. Luis called

and the deal was struck to purchase their first boat, a Grady-White *Gulfstream 232*.

Having spent a lot of time as a kid and young adult fishing, Luis was familiar with boats but had never captained one. When the summer came to an end, the boat's previous owner took Luis out to get familiar with the boat. "The swells that day were two to two-and-a-half feet, and my heart was hammering like it never had before," said Luis.

It didn't take long for him to get comfortable with the boat and soon he invited his niece's boyfriend to go offshore. This was his first time going offshore in his own boat and luckily it was a beautiful day. "Like a pond," Luis remembered, when recalling one of his best memories on the 232. It took a few tries for them to get it right, but by the end of the day, he and his mate had landed Luis' first tuna as the captain of his own boat. "I didn't really know what to do once the fish was on the line," Luis remembers. "So, the first one we couldn't reel in - it was just too hard. Now I know I needed to slow the speed of the boat." A second tuna hit the line, and once again they had a hard time reeling it in. Before they could boat the

fish, it broke off. The third time the line went down Luis said, "We're getting this fish on the boat!" And they did!

After that first exciting trip to the Canyons, Luis embarked on many other trips. A pivotal moment came three years later, during a trip with an experienced boater, when a storm blew in with large swells. While he was never afraid, the fatigue of maneuvering the boat in such big seas did get to him. After a more than

three-hour return trip – with a nice wahoo – Luis walked through the door and said to Melissa, "I want a bigger boat." He knew he wanted to continue offshore fishing and that a larger boat would allow him more time on the water and added comfort when the seas decided to kick it up a notch.

Melissa, who had seen how much Luis loved going out on the boat and enjoying time on the water herself, wholeheartedly

supported his new boat venture. From there, he started researching and analyzing the benefits of a number of different boats in various size ranges. It was during this evaluation stage that he and Melissa traveled to North Carolina to the Grady-White factory – a trip that would prove to be a deciding factor in their purchase of another Grady-White. "I finally narrowed it down to two boats, one being a Grady-White *Express 370*, and Melissa said,



'You've loved the one you have, just get the Grady,'" Luis said. "And we did!"

Both have enjoyed fishing, cruising, and making new memories on the 370. One of Luis' most memorable moments on the new boat involves another trip to the Canyons this time traveling 80 miles offshore with four other seasoned fishermen. They left in the afternoon and arrived in time to troll a little before dark. With the new high-tech equipment, they were able to park the boat in one location and set a twomile radius around the boat so they would be notified if another boat came too close. Then, three men slept while two fished for swordfish. "I was

they would be notified if another boat in the heated cabin and at the helm that I came too close. Then, three men slept while two fished for swordfish. "I was next morning Luis grilled fresh mahi for the crew – all whom were really impressed

with the boat. "This crew had a lot of different boating experiences from large to small boats, and were amazed at the stability the 13-foot beam and standard Seakeeper® provided.

Luis and Melissa give a lot of credit for their great Grady experiences to their dealer, Taylor Marine, and Grady-White. "They are all just good, genuine people," they note. "Unlike other boat manufacturers, Grady-White sees their boats as more than just a product.
